C.N.A. APPOINTS NEW EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

For the past number of years, you have seen yours truly sitting beside the C.N.A. President at C.N.A. Executive meetings, at the head table of the Annual General Membership meeting, taking minutes at the Club Delegates Breakfast Meeting and manning the C.N.A. Information Table. All that will change at the 2006 C.N.A. Convention.

PAUL JOHNSON APPOINTED C.N.A. EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

Charles "Chuck" Moore, President of the Canadian Numismatic Association, is pleased to announce the appointment of Paul Johnson as the Association's new Executive Secretary. Paul Johnson began collecting coins in 1965, joining both the Canadian Numismatic Association in 1972. Currently, he is a member of about 30 numismatic associations and has been a Life Member of the C.N.A. since 1978.

Paul has held several elected and appointed positions in the C.N.A. including Second Vice-President, Ontario Director and Finance Chairman. Paul is currently the Education Committee Chairman and has served in that position since 1991. He has coordinated numerous book projects and was the Editor of the first CNA Numismatic Correspondence Course released in 1995 as well as the second one, which was launched at the 2005 CNA Convention in Calgary. He served the CNA as Junior Director (1972–1974), Club Services Chairman (1975–1978), Finance Committee Chairman (1977–1983), Ontario Director (1977–1979), Second Vice President (1979–1981) and Toronto area Director (1981-1987). Paul was an exhibit judge at most CNA Conventions from 1979 to 2004. He received the J. Douglas Ferguson Gold Medal Award in 1995, the CNA Fellow Award in 1997, the CNA Great Distinction Award in 1997 and the CNA Presidential Award in 2005. He has served on many CNA Convention committees, including 2006 (Niagara Falls) as Program Chairman and Exhibit Chairman.

He served the Ontario Numismatic Association as Head Exhibit Judge from 1997 to 2006 and as Award of Merit Committee Chairman from 1991 to 1999. Paul received the ONA Award of Merit in 1985 and the ONA Fellow award in 2001. He has held ONA Life Membership since 1983.

Paul joined the American Numismatic Association in 1972, the year he also received the ANA Outstanding Young Numismatist award. He also received the ANA Presidential award in 1995. In 1996 Paul received the title of MASTER NUMISMATIST for completing the ANA Numismatic Diploma Program.

Paul has been an active exhibitor at coin shows since 1967 and has received numerous Best of Show awards including two at past CNA Conventions 1975 and 1977. He has exhibited competitively in every Canadian province except Newfoundland and has exhibited in 25 different states of the United States since 1973.

He has been a writer, exhibitor and speaker at numerous numismatic functions throughout Canada and the United States during his 40 years in numismatics. Paul has served on the executive of the North York Coin Club over a 20-year span as Vice President, Director and Program Chairman, receiving a Life Membership in 1998. He was also on the executive of the Peterborough (Ontario) Coin Club from 1966 to 1971.

His 33-year background as a General Accountant, Financial Analyst and Cost Accountant in the manufacturing and service industries will serve him well in his new position. Paul is married to his wife Mary-Ellen and they have a nine-year-old daughter Laura.

The junior selected by the judges to receive the Grand Prize on the basis of the five questions they would ask the President of the Royal Canadian Mint is Christine Guyatt-Woodland of Vernon, Ontario. NIAGARA HISTORIAN TO ADDRESS C.N.A. BANQUET

Mr. Sherman Zavitz, official historian for the City of Niagara Falls and the Niagara Parks Commission, has consented to be the keynote speaker at the Banquet of the 2006 C.N.A. Convention. His presentation is entitled "Niagara Falls: The Weird and the Unusual."

Mr. Zavitz, born in Welland, Ontario, has been a resident of Niagara Falls for 46 years where he was an elementary school teacher for 35 years, retiring in 1995.

He is a past president of The Lundy's Lane Historical Society, a past chair of the Niagara Falls Board of Museums and was the Chair of the City of Niagara Falls Centennial Book Committee. He has written a weekly column for the *Niagara Falls Review* since 1993, featuring subjects of local historical interest (Niagara Then and Now, A Niagara Note, A Picture from the Past). He has also written five books: "Niagara Then and Now," "Niagara Falls Then and Now" and "It Happened at Niagara" Series 1, 2 & 3). Some of the books will be made available in the door draw.

THE ROYAL CANADIAN MINT TO UNVEIL NEW MINT MARK

The Royal Canadian Mint is preparing to officially unveil a new Mint Mark, a symbol of the Mint's reputation for high quality and innovation. The Mint Mark will be officially presented on July 21 during the 2006 Canadian Numismatic Association Convention in Niagara Falls. In the future, all new circulation and collector coins produced by the Royal Canadian Mint will proudly bear the Mint Mark.

THE 2006 C.N.A. CONVENTION SOUVENIR MEDAL

One hundred years ago, in 1906, the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, the first public hydro-electric company in Canada, was formed when the Ontario Legislature passed the Power Commission Act establishing the then Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario (HEPC). The governor of Ontario, Sir James P. Whitney, appointed Adam Beck its first Chairman, a position he held until his death in 1925.

SIR ADAM BECK

Sir Adam Beck was a prosperous London, Ontario, manufacturer, who was simultaneously the Mayor and the Conservative member of the provincial Legislature (which was then permitted). Given Ontario's water power resources at Niagara, Beck was an early champion of municipal and provincial electric power ownership to spur economic development. When his party won the election of 1905, the time was right for Beck to implement his conviction that power from Niagara Falls should be available at cost to Ontario municipalities. In the government of Conservative Leader, James Whitney, Beck became "Power Minister" and chairman of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, the world's first publicly-owned utility.

Its initial project was to build a 110,000-volt transmission line from Niagara Falls to carry power to southwestern Ontario municipalities, including Toronto.

In 1914, Beck was knighted by King George V for services rendered to the Commonwealth of Canada, specifically for his promotion of electricy. Sir Adam served as Chairman of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario until his death in 1925 and was instrumental in developing the 450-megawatt Queenston Chippawa power station at Niagara. At the time, this was the largest power station in the world. In 1950, this station was renamed Sir Adam Beck I in his honor.

Demand for power after World War II led to the development of the adjacent Sir Adam Beck No. 2 GS.

Sir Adam Beck, who was appointed the first Chairman of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario exactly 100 years ago, is memorialized on the C.N.A. Convention medal issued as a souvenir of the convention held in Niagara Falls, Ontario.

The Niagara Falls Hydro-Electric Power Plant, designed by Nikola Tesla and financed by George Westinghouse, was finished in 1895. Tesla's induction motor revolutionized the industry and household appliances in the 19th and 20th century. It was proclaimed one of the ten greatest inventions of all times. Nikola Tesla developed polyphase alternating current system of generators, motors and transformers, which George Westinghouse bought.

Niagara Falls was the final victory of Tesla's Alternating Current (AC) Electricity over Edison's Direct Current (DC) Electricity. Niagara Falls marked a new era of electricity in the world. The electrification of America and the world has begun after Niagara Falls Power Plant.

In Toronto, there is a statue of Beck, sculpted by Emanuel Hahn, a well-known coin designer, on University Avenue at Queen Street West. The head of this statue appears on the convention medal, engraved from a photograph taken by C.N.A. member Paul Petch, who designed the medal.

He has given similar presentations throughout his extensive involvement in the numismatic error hobby.

After Bill's presentation, we will be conducting an open discussion on the future of this area of the hobby and will be looking for interest and support in forming a Canadian Error and Varieties Enthusiasts association.
